In the midst of all the darkness in the world, the thought that light is powerful enough to take it on and stand right in the middle of it is comforting and hopeful.

Yet darkness has a pretty strong track record. Wars, poverty, racism, famine, violence, addictions, betrayal, deception, injustice, corruption, and so on. The list of its accomplishments is long.

So, calling out darkness and elevating light seems a little naïve, actually, given the ways darkness brings deep shadows to our lives and to our world. Yet that is exactly what the season of Epiphany does. It focuses us on the light and its ability to infiltrate and keep shining in the midst of the worst that can confront us.

The magi who travel hundreds of miles to pay homage to Jesus were part of a long line, many generations, of sky watchers, who night by night looked into the darkness, seeking for the light. After centuries of waiting and watching, they launch out to find its origin when they see its vibrant glow. It is no short journey, no easy endeavor. It takes determined effort to follow and get to the light. When they finally arrive at its source, they are surprised, yet they recognize God's hand in it and open themselves to it as they bow and present their gifts at the manger.

The American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language defines "epiphany" as:

- 1) A Christian feast celebrating the manifestation of the divine nature of Jesus to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi.
- 2) A revelatory manifestation of a divine being.
- 3) A sudden insight or intuitive understanding.

The trip of the magi encompasses all three of those. We celebrate that the magi not only experienced a revelatory manifestation of a divine being, but they also received a "sudden insight and intuitive understanding" of the new way God was at work in the world, crossing barriers and building bridges across them.

The season of Epiphany not only contrasts the light and shadow in the world, but it focuses us on the way the Spirit of Christ is present in the midst of the darkest of places. Epiphany calls us to open the darker places in our own lives to the light, to receive it, be healed by it, and then to carry it with us as we walk out in the world.

The first Sunday in January is Epiphany Sunday. In worship we'll be celebrating the magi and their trip to the light in worship—and God's invitation to us to live in light. We'll carry that over from worship as we gather for brunch afterward, to celebrate the light in this church and to dream together for how we continue to journey with it. I hope you will join us. There will be plenty of food—and lots of light!

The Administrative Committee of the UCSJ Council met in December and, along with regular business, discussed several matters. These include the fact that the drainage plan for the west side of the church will be delayed until spring of 2026. Safety for folks parking there will continue to be the use of mats in inclement conditions. Someone to plow that area will be secured to remove snow as needed.



Breakfast Forum — Saturday, January 17, at 8:30 AM

The speaker will be Alan Todd, and the title of his presentation is "Sylvia Smith the Central Figure in Marble and Its Mine Demise."

SUBJECT: At the turn of the last century in Colorado mining towns, it was rare indeed to see a woman newspaper owner/publisher. Sylvia Smith, whether she was writing in her Crested Butte newspaper, "The Weekly Citizen," or later in her Marble newspaper, the "Marble City Times," was opinionated and often critical of both towns and their mining operations.

She was recruited to Marble during its heyday. In a few short years, she was a central figure in the mine and town's demise.

This is the story of labor, stock selling, conspiracy, retribution and a woman in a man's world during the rise and fall of the Colorado Yule Marble Company.



BIO: Alan Todd has been working for and contributing to newspapers for over 40 years. In his corporate days, he worked for Cox Communications for 26 years, in markets big and small including Austin, Grand Junction, Longview, TX and Marshal, TX. He is the previous owner of the Ouray County Plaindealer and The Ridgway Sun, from 2010 to 2019. He currently serves on the board of the Ouray County Historical Society for which he fills the role of Archivist. He has served on other boards including both the Ridgway and Ouray chambers, East Texas Symphony, East Texas Crime Stoppers, United Way, public radio, Gregg County 2000 Census, Northwest Austin Little League and more.

Alan is married to Angela Todd. He has two grown children and two grandchildren.

Alan also owns and operates The Sock Mine, a novelty store on Main Street in Ouray, and has written a weekly Colorado history column in the Montrose Daily Press for the past five years.

He likes to fly fish, do Mr. Builder projects around the house and play the cello, occasionally in tune.
